Issue Description:

The National Union of Students is the peak student union in Australia. They are responsible for a variety of campaigns and work to support the interests of students nation-wide. Western SRC has historically been affiliated with the NUS. Western Sydney University also holds 7 NUS delegate positions, enabling Western Sydney University to have a presence and the ability to vote on policy etc. at the National Conference each year.

Portfolios/Students Impacted:

All SRC reps and all students.

Recommendation:

That the SRC approve the annual payment of NUS affiliation fees. If the exact cost of affiliation fees is unavailable prior to the SRC's July 23rd meeting, the SRC should approve a maximum amount. Based on the 2019 affiliation fees of ~\$2500, the SRC should approve an amount of *up to* \$3500. It is anticipated affiliation will be more in line with the 2019 figure, however approving a higher amount ensures the SRC will be able to pay the fees ASAP without the need to move another motion.

Justification/Reason for Recommendation:

The NUS continue to campaign for students nation-wide and it is important that Western Sydney University students have a voice and a vote in order to shape the landscape of student policy.

Issue Description:

The intent of this chat is to ensure we can discuss the issues and bounce ideas off fellow SRC members prior needing to vote on them. This will encourage more polished agenda presentation and clear objectives for the agenda items.

This chat could be run by anyone willing to keep it organised (i.e. setting up a zoom link and turning up most weeks). I am happy to put my name up to organise this each month. However, whoever

does organise it needs to align it with the SRC monthly meeting organised by the General Secretary. I anticipate that making the general chat flexible of when it meets would be the most sensible course of action, as it is optional and should therefore be changeable around our responsibilities.

It only needs to be prior to the regular SRC meetings, adhering to the regular meeting practices and expectations (Not meeting out of regular SRC hours, and not lining up this meeting just before the monthly SRC meeting – this would make it possible to exceed the regular total meeting time for one sitting) but conversed with an informal nature (being about to chat rather than having a rigid structure).

Note: I feel that this chat should only have all WSU Fellow SRC member in optional attendance. I would like to know the council's opinion on whether border a border scope should be considered (such as general collective reps as an example).

Portfolios/Students Impacted:

All SRC elected members if they opt to attend. This will help encourage cross campus interaction as well, so it will likely help students are each campus that gets involved.

Recommendation:

I recommend that the council vote to establish a general chat that fills the communication gap and encourages further discourse. This can be organized by me or any other council member who we wish to establish to set it up. I believe this chat would stay on zoom even when Uni goes back, as there is chat is about increasing convenience, and keeping informal and easy to access is the best method I believe.

Additionally, whoever organises it should establish good meeting times each month. One example this could be done is using the current method of a doodle poll.

Justification/Reason for Recommendation:

I have noticed in the previous SRC that it was hard to read all the agendas, so I feel that a short chat prior to the meeting can help clear up any confusion, and also provide any new reps to ask questions on the meeting, and questions that would usually disrupt the flow of the meeting can be addressed here. This way, all the important things get said at the meeting, and all the comprehension questions are given a platform to be answered.

Issue Description:

The students at Parra City campus only have access to Table Tennis and PlayStation when it comes to entertainment at the campus. Comparing to other campuses the Parra city campus has least activities in terms of engagement because of its infrastructure.

Portfolios/Students Impacted:

Students Studying at Parra City Campus.

Recommendation:

Provide more activities (games) on campus to increase engagement and improve student life on campus. We can install a Foosball table, Air hockey and some popular board games for the same.

Justification/Reason for Recommendation:

More games would improve engagement and improve the student life on campus. Also, it would target more students as not all students would be involved in table tennis and PlayStation and would increase the student interaction on campus.

Budget Impact:

4.7. Multi-Purpose Courts – Nikodin Matic

Portfolios Impacted:

Issue:

- Current concrete floors increase injury seriousness and likelihood of injury and isn't safe to play sports on regularly.
- Current set up doesn't allow play on rainy days.
- Limits the sports that can be played on the courts.
- Increases costs to student clubs as they would need to hire courts externally to safely play their sport.
- Sporting infrastructure at WSU is significantly below the standards of facilities at other Universities.
- ♣ Vertical Campuses and the planned vertical Campuses along with planned light rail continue to get rid of the very few sporting facilities we currently have.

Recommendation:

To install a PP sports floor which is portable and is designed for both outdoor and indoor at a low cost and a large 5 - 6 year warranty with a 10 year useful life.

Reasons for Recommendation:

- Would decrease the risk of injury and seriousness of injury.
- Would allow sport to be played all year round.
- Cost per day for ONLY the warranty period is \$4.26 per day roughly.
- Unique funding arrangement is being arranged with some sport student clubs funding a share of the costs and Provost funding will be requested.
- Would help create new student clubs like the Handball Club amongst others.
- Multiple sports can be played on the court.
- Court would have SRC branding.
- Would allow more events to be hosted.

Budget Impact:

Items	Quotes/Cost
PP Sports Courts	\$9000

Proposed Action

I move that the Western Sydney University SRC allocates a maximum of \$9000 towards the PP Sports Project.

The SRC acknowledges that the cost will be far lower as WSU Sports Student Clubs will fund a share of the costs and the VPA will seek Provost funding for it so the SRC share of the final cost currently estimated to be \$8500 including delivery and all taxes.

4.8. Factsheet on Gender and Sexuality Diversity by Academics – Clare Da Silva

Issue Description:

A group of academics at Western have put together a fact sheet on gender and sexual diversity. This fact sheet has been worked on a few academics and is being led by Dr Braham Marjadi from the school of medicine. We have been contacted by these academics to see if we had any input on the document they are realising and if we would like to support it.

About the document: I have been sent a copy of the document which is still currently being drafted by the academics. The purpose f the document states that "This document is written as a contribution to the debate by focusing on existing scientific evidence around gender and sexuality. In particular, this document addresses issues around transgender which is one of the most debated

topics of late. This document -- or rather, a collection of documents -- presents the current state of knowledge (as of July 2020) based on the academic work at Western Sydney University. We want this document to inform debates and help separate belief-based opinions from evidence-based statements. Consequently, we specifically aim to clarify some misconceptions surrounding the transgender identity."

I am happy to show the document to other SRC representatives at their request - it is still being drafted by academics and is in a shared google document.

Portfolios/Students Impacted:

Queer Representative, LGBTQIA+ students, general student population across all campuses.

Recommendation:

That the SRC support this document and if any members have any input/ want to contribute to the document that they can so.

Justification/Reason for Recommendation:

This document comes at an important time, in relation to John Whitehall's comments. This information coming from academics at the university and support coming from both the queer collective and the SRC is extremely important. Also being a part of this makes sure that we can contribute and see what message and information is being given to students by academics.

Budget Impact:

Proposed Action:

I move that the SRC support this document and that the SRC share this project once it is completed.

- 4 14 student clubs have collaborated to oragnise and host a \$700 kahoot in Semester one and have the funding in place to host another \$700 kahoot in Semester 2. I would like the SRC to contribute \$300 to that figure to make it \$1000 and encourage more students to engage in the activity.
- The \$700 kahoot had over 320 participants and was a great success.

- With the extra funding, I believe more students will be keen to participate. 500+
- Overall feedback from first event was that students wanted more collaborative kahoots with big prizes up for grabs.

Portfolios Impacted:

Issue:

- The gym which is run by an external party has been allowed to re-open.
- ♣ External sporting teams are currently using the sporting facilities at Hawkesbury but a WSU student club HAC is not able to use the very same facilities and play a similar sport.
- This indicates that revenue and external parties are being placed ahead of student clubs and their members.
- If external rugby clubs and comps can use the facilities, then why can't our student clubs who pay SSAF fees for those very same facilities.
- ♣ Furthermore, many other sports have returned months ago and can train and play regularly while student clubs have to hire courts and facilities at a large cost to student clubs instead of using WSU facilities.

Recommendation:

- If external parties can use WSU facilities, then I see no reason why WSU student clubs cannot use the very same facilities.
- Allow the student clubs to use WSU sporting facilities with a strict risk assessment and Covid procedures based on their relevant sports bodies' guidelines.

Reasons for Recommendation:

Student clubs are spending their limited budget on hiring courts and facilities while external parties are using the very same facilities that they are restricted from.

Budget Impact: NA

Proposed Action

I move that the Western Sydney University SRC recommends to the University to allow WSU student clubs to use WSU sporting facilities when student clubs have fulfilled a risk assessment and follow their respective peak bodies Covid guidelines.

A week before Semester 2 exams and some lecturers have not released learning guides for some units which is unacceptable.

- Students are buying older versions of textbooks as they are relying on older learning guides as the updated learning guides are released too late.
- Students can't order textbooks till the week before or the week the classes start and by the time the get delivered its already a couple weeks in or if the textbook is sold then it's a long wait.
- Students are behind work/ assessments/ homework tasks before they even start as learning guides are released too late and playing catch up.

Budget Impact: NA

I move that the Western Sydney University SRC makes a statement that it demands all leaning guides to be up on Vuws at least two weeks prior to the start date and condemn the current practice whereby some students one week out from their first class still don't have access to a learning guide. We urge the Academic Senate and other relevant departments to review the timeliness of learning guides.

Issue Description:

Background: It was mentioned to me that traditionally all the campuses used to have their own individual Facebook pages for distributing information. They were then rolled into the SRC page to present things in a more unified way on a page with the complete events.

However, the limitations of this change, is it has made promoting campus specific issues and events more difficult than it was previously. Students wanting to know only about their local campus currently need to scroll through everything before finding things that are relevant to them.

Some campuses and collectives (already) have their own pages which they distribute information from. This has been working well for them.

Resultantly, I believe we should utilise both approaches and have our own Facebook pages for our portfolios (our represented campus or collectives). But, I believe this also needs to be optional, because there is no point in making another Facebook page if it will remain inactive.

Comparably, I suggest that everyone who does have a currently active page, assist those who are yet to have one in whatever capacity you can. Let's start these pages off well.

Portfolios/Students Impacted:

This would relate to any groups

Recommendation:

I encourage SRC member who currently lack Facebook pages to create their own. To make sure that we have proper support to start it effectively: everyone who has a page, it would help a great deal if you assisting with their creation. This crates a much stronger position than the alternative of reps being left to figure it out, without utilising the abundance of talented support our SRC has.

Justification/Reason for Recommendation:

Introducing this will improve communication responsiveness time in the individual campuses/collective and allow targeted information for the students who wish to know specifically and quickly about their own campus/collective.

On behalf of all our members of the Western Sydney Shooters club, I would like to inform the SRC that the installation of the PP sports floor would contribute positively to our club in the following ways and is needed.

✓ Reduce or remove court hire fees that are a burden on student clubs.

✓ Allow events to take place during wet weather.

✓ The new PP floor is safer to play on and reduces the severity of some injuries and will encourage students to participate more.

✓ Provides an excellent upgrade to the current concrete flooring at a very low cost per student per use.

Our club is willing to fund \$1000 of the cost to ensure it happens.

I encourage and recommend that the SRC make this positive investment in the sporting infrastructure which is very lacking at WSU currently.

Additional Information on the PP Sports Floor System POLYPROYLENE SPORTS FLOOR SYSTEM

PP interlocking floor is a sports flooring system of tiles that interlocks together to create a solid surface that is one of the safest outdoor sports floors in the world. They can be played on outside/indoor and bought in dry and wet weather. The PP floor has an expected useful life of 10 years. It can be used to play multiple sports on it including basketball, netball, handball, futsal, tennis, volleyball, badminton etc. Some of the advantages include:

25

Multiple sports: Flooring will have the lines marked out for basketball, netball, futsal, tennis, volleyball and handball allowing 6 sports to be played on the one court.

Warranty and useful life expectancy: Warranty is covered for 6 years and expected useful life is 10 years ensuring it is a long-life asset and can be used by WSU students beyond 2030.

Budget: \$90,000 AUD (+/-10% interval) which includes court markings for multiple sports and shipping to Sydney for a 30x 15m court of roughly 450sqm. Only \$2.74 a day over the 10-year expected life or \$4.56 per day over the 6 years that is covered by warranty to give 100's of WSU students a SAFE place to play sports daily.

Unique Funding: Proposal is that the 4/5 sports clubs each contribute \$1,000 towards the infrastructure upgrade. With Covid-19, clubs should have spent a little of their budget and should have money left over and some clubs have already signified their intention to contribute. SRC would contribute the rest which should consist of \$5,000-6000 maximum.

Portability and weather impact: PP floor is portable and can be used outdoor and indoor. Although the Kingswood Courts are undercover, they are exposed from the sides which allows rain onto the court and prohibits play. The PP floor is an all-weather court which would allow courts to be used in all weather. Sydney averages 95 days of rainfall a year. The PP court would allow WSU students to use the multisport courts an extra 95 days a year, or 950 days over the 10-year expected life or 570 days over the 6-year warranty covered period.

Set-up: Very quick and easy to set up. 4-6 Unskilled individuals can set it up in 1.5 hours. Only tool that is needed is a couple rubber mallets. Installation process can be seen here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=4yVPAuulVW8

Removes court hire fees: As some sports like handball and futsal are just too dangerous to play on currently along with netball, basketball and volleyball with the long term effects on individual's joints from running and jumping on concrete, the only other alternative is to hire an indoor court.

The cost to hire an indoor court for ONLY 1.5 hours a week and for ONLY 2x14 weeks (28 weeks total) is \$2520 per year. That figure for only one club like the futsal club is \$25,200 over 10 years or \$15,120 over the 6 year warranty period. Once again, that is only for one sports club. This would free up the budget of many student clubs to spend it on bigger and better events for WSU students.

New student clubs: Student will create a handball club if this flooring is introduced as it is just too dangerous and risky to play handball on the current concrete at Kingswood. This club will add more variety to the sports on offer at WSU and increase participation.

Reduction of injury severity: The new flooring system will significantly reduce the severity of injuries that occur. The joints of students will have significantly less impact on the PP floor than the current concrete. An example of the reduction of injury is that a 10cm drop to hit your head on concrete is the equivalent of a 60cm drop on a PP floor.

Encourage more participants: The new floor will encourage more participants as many students including high level athletes and members of the elite athlete program of WSU will not play on the current concrete since their risk of injury is just too high at the moment. Many ordinary students see the risk as being too high with the load on joints and hard and rough surface at the moment. The new PP floor is safer to play on and reduces the severity of some injuries and will encourage students to participate more.

Branding: The court will have the SRC logo in the key located at the centre of the court to improve the reputation of the SRC.

Testing: Rolling Load = ≥3500N Rebound/Bounce: 95% true Temperature: -30°C - 70°C


